Discover Ludwell Valley Park: Self-guided Walk

Walk 2. The Ridge & Round Hill

This walk is designed to be used in conjunction with a walk map available here

The numbered gate references, park entrance points and field names in this walk guide are shown on this map.

Duration 25 - 25 minutes

Level Easy but some rough paths, not suitable for wheelchairs and pushchairs

Start Pynes Hill Gate, between the Redrow building and Aston Court, Pynes Hill, Exeter,

EX2 5AZ





DIRECTIONS

- 1. Go through the Pynes Hill entrance gate, along the short path, through the next gate and enter Free Field where you will see a display board. Take the diagonal path across the field, to your right, towards the end of the hedgerow. Follow the fence round to the left and go through Gate 1 into Barn and Court Field on the north side of the ridge.
- 2. Walk along the north side of the ridge, passing through three gates, keeping the fence and trees on your left and the fields sloping off to your right. *Note the views of the Exeter cityscape*.
- 3. At the end of the tree line, as you pass a small copse on your right, go through Gate 8, and enter Shoulder and Mutton Field. You will see a copse on a mound at the lower end of the field (Round Hill). Keeping the perimeter fence on your right, follow the path down towards the copse, passing the "Fool on the Hill" seat on your right. You can follow the middle path directly towards and around the copse and back to the top of the field. Alternatively, for a longer walk, continue to follow the boundary fence down, circling the large field and make your way back up the hill returning to the point where you entered the field. You will pass through Great Meadow, Tea Field and 5 Acres and pass several access points to Ludwell Valley Park on the way.
- 4. At the top of the field turn immediately right through Gate 8 into another field, with a bench straight ahead of you. Here you can admire the fine views over the Exe Estuary towards Topsham and Exmouth. Take the perimeter path around this field in an anti-clockwise direction, returning through Gate 9 on your right.
- 5. Follow the path along the hedgerow boundary to the left of the field, which is full of wildflowers in the summer. Go through Gate 10 on this path and back into Free Field where you began your walk. You will see a path on the right leading back to Pynes Hill entrance.

What to look out for

Look over the Exeter skyline and identify landmarks – Exeter Cathedral, Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital, University, Heavitree Church, St Leonards Church

Enjoy the view over the Exe estuary towards Exmouth and note Haldon Belvedere tower on the horizon to the west

Spot the wildlife including a great variety of British and migrating birds including buzzards, woodpeckers, goldfinches. Foxes, rabbits and squirrels are often seen in the valley as well as dragonflies near the Northbrook (or, as it is known locally, the Panny)

Enjoy the trees and wildflower meadows and look out for butterflies and bees.

Enjoying your visit

To get the most from your visit without harming the wildlife that lives there, please remember:

Respect wildlife

Dogs

Dogs are welcome in the Valley Park, but please keep them under control and clean up after your dog. There are a number of dog bins at entrances to the Valley Park.

In the winter, there are likely to be overwintering birds looking for food, particularly in those fields where you see the signs explaining this. It is particularly important to control your dog in these fields ie keep them to the edges of the fields only, as they are specially planted to attract important bird species such as cirl buntings and the birds will not use these fields if disturbed.

Cattle

There are cattle in some fields from April to October – please keep your dog under close control and do not allow them to approach the cattle.

Be properly dressed

Generally the terrain is uneven and after rain, some paths can be very muddy.. Make sure you have the right footwear – Wellington boots or stout shoe / walking boots are advised – and wear sensible clothing. You may find a walking stick helpful on the slopes.

Toilet facilities

Wonford Sports Centre, (Burnthouse Lane, Exeter EX2 6NF) have very kindly said that anyone doing one of the Ludwell Life guided walks is welcome to use the Centre's toilet facilities. Just tell the staff on reception that you are on a 'Ludwell Life walk' and they will show you the loos.
